I submitted a VA disability claim for medical issues secondary to prostate cancer due to ionizing radiation I absorbed during my service on the Stimson. The VA has sent me a questionnaire requesting a lot of specific information regarding the times and locations where I was subject to radiation. Hopefully someone can help me fill in some gaps in my memory.

- 1. When did we enter SY1 in Newport News, and when did we leave the SY? And after sea trials post SY1, when did the first patrol commence? I think I was on the second post SY1 patrol though.
- 2. Although I was a Certified Nuclear Welder, fortunately I never had to enter the reactor compartment underway to perform emergency repairs. Had I done so I would not now be alive to write you. But I did spend an inordinate amount of time in the RC doing cleaning, polishing and routine maintenance.
- 3. Does anyone have any idea where the records of radiation exposure for former shipmates are maintained?

The Health Corner

I can remember when I was in my 20s, my mother was told she needed to go on a very low or salt free diet to lower her blood pressure. That was a whopper of a lie. Low salt diets are a scam. The body needs salt. I remember a Star Trek episode where this salt eating creature would suck the salt out of a person and they would immediately die. If the heart doesn't have enough salt, it will quit working, The kidneys are akin to a sodium pump. Without salt, they stop working. Any wonder why they usually give one a diuretic to prevent buildup of fluids?

High blood pressure is a symptom of problem. It is not the cause. One of the main causes blood pressure rises is because the blood vessels have lost their elasticity. There are a number of factors that can cause hardening of the arteries as it was called years ago.

Of course, the pharmaceutical companies want to sell you drugs so one thing they have done is LOWER the BP threshold for treatment. In 1980, the guideline was anything over 160 in older

people should be considered for treatment. Now, anything over 130 must be addressed - meds.

The most common side effect of BP meds is complication from perfusion - fluid movement on the body. For instance, not getting enough blood to the brain can cause fainting and falling which can cause major problems especially for older people. There are 4 groups of BP meds - diuretics, beta blockers, calcium channel blockers, and ACE inhibitors. If you take BP meds, you need to understand how these meds work and the side effects they have. Don't just take your doctors word for it.

What can I do? Get off your butt. Interval Walking Training was observed to help improve lower blood pressure with a lot of other benefits too. Moderate exercise like walking is highly beneficial, with benefits increasing from 2,000 to 12,000 steps daily.

Slow running and light-intensity exercise increases brain neural activity in the hippocampus and provides mental health benefits. Walking is enhanced through various methods like weighted vests, Nordic walking, outdoor nature walks, social walking ... get friends involved and make it fun!

Whatever you do, do your own research and devise a plan that is good for you.

In the beginning... building a submarine despite the odds (1900)

The 125th Anniversary of the United States Submarine force will occur in April of 2025. This is one of a number of articles related to that celebration.

I spend a lot of time researching history and my favorite source material comes from the National Archives. Specifically, I use a lot of information that comes from newspapers that have been captured in electronic format and can be searched by subject matter and date. In the past, many of my posts were about submarine development and particularly about early submarine advances and challenges. In the year 1900, technology was advancing at a rapid rate. Electricity and power generation were some of the key areas that were significant. The industrial revolution had produced the raw materials that made many of the inventions practical.

An article in January of that year talked about the mountain of patents that were filed and the success and failure of many of them. Inventors were the pioneers of the age and everything form wireless radio to potential for manned flight were already on the books. They actual achievement of many patents was still in the dreaming stage, but the government filed them, nonetheless.

Nearly 100 years ago, flying between the continental US and Hawaii was still a dream. That dream was about to be become reality in 1925, But there would be a few bumps along the way. Even though aircraft development had surged between the Wright Brothers first sustained flight to the cross-country feats of the early nineteen twenties, flight to the Hawaiian Islands had not yet been accomplished. Interestingly enough, the commander of the mission was actually trained by the Wright Brothers before the mission.


Windows 11 Snipping Tool – New and Improved

Back in March 2020 I covered the Windows 10 "Snip and Sketch Tool" under Windows 10. For Windows 11 it was renamed to more simply the "Snipping Tool". It operates in the same manner as before –


SHIFT + Windows Key + "S" and the screen dims a little and you drag it over the desired area. Simple enough.

But it has some options that you need to be aware of in this new tool.

So, if you click on the Windows Logo key to get to the App menu, then click on the Snipping Tool icon to get this:



Use the "..." selection on the upper right side to get an options menu, the select Settings. This gives you a number of items you can change, most importantly where your screen shots are stored:



The second part of the setting menu deals with Screen Recording. If you do things like Zoom calls or Skype calls from your PC/Laptop, then this could be a very handy feature to use. Here are the setting options for that feature:

Safeguarding Seniors in our Digital World

Welcome back to the Security Corner! Last month I touched on three different scams that

have been merging in our lives in recent times. The digital world we live in, our increasing connectivity, and the emergence of Artificial Intelligence in our lives makes awareness of emerging techniques and defensive approaches critical to our safety, both physical and financial.

This month I will provide links to articles that I believe enable us to make an informed decision about how we travel safely in the digital world.

I recently had a friend contact me about how to deal with the malicious pop-ups we often get on our PCs and Laptops. In the Windows world (Windows 10 or 11) use the **ALT+F4** key combination to terminate the pop-up screen without interacting with any links or buttons on the pop-up screen.

For Apple users, here's an article link that describes the steps to get rid of the pop-up with no interaction with its contents:

What To Do If You See An iPhone Trojan Virus Detected Popup

On an iPad, do the following:

<u>Carefully</u> swipe up the pop-up window as you would any app you want to hide but not halt - yet

In Settings – turn on Airplane Mode, note that Wi-fi and Bluetooth are automatically switched off'

Swipe up Settings, like you would do to close it out, where the page decreases in size. You can then see both it and the malicious page on the screen. The swipe the malicious page up to remove it. By going to airplane mode, you have eliminated the ability for the malicious page to interact with the threat actor by removing the ability to communicate over the Internet or Bluetooth.

Now for Safari, and/or your alternate browser, use the Clear History and Website Data function for the Safari browser under its App settings, and/or the appropriate history clearing function for alternate browsers. Bookmarks will not be affected.

Finally, go back into Settings and turn-off Airplane Mode - note that your Wi-Fi and Bluetooth will connections will resume and reconnect to their normal connections.

Due to enhanced security measures, all visitors to VA clinics located on military installations must now follow stricter entry procedures. These changes directly impact Veterans with appointments at our Beaufort and Goose Creek VA clinics. To ensure you receive timely care, please review these important changes to installation entry procedures:

Key Changes:

- Trusted Traveler Program is suspended
- 100% ID check for all vehicle occupants 18 and older
- Base pass required for anyone without a DoD ID Card (CAC or DBIDS)

Get passes at the installation's visitor center Impact on VA Appointments:

- Expect delays at entry points
- Plan to arrive early for appointments and bring valid government-issued photo ID Please contact your clinic directly if you anticipate issues reaching your appointment due to these new requirements.

VA Phone-based Emergency Care Goes National

DAV News for Veterans - Jan/Feb 2025

Emergency care is now available by phone for veterans enrolled in the Department of Veterans Affairs health care system. Tele-emergency care (tele-EC) gives veterans access to VA emergency care from anywhere.

"Veterans can now be evaluated for possible emergencies from the comfort of their home," said VA Under Secretary for Health Dr. Shereef Elnahal. "Sometimes you're not sure whether what you're experiencing is a minor emergency or not, and tele-emergency care can help you resolve those guestions.

As part of VA Health Connect, a clinical triage nurse evaluates veterans over the phone or through video chat. In cases where there's a lifethreatening emergency, the triage nurse calls 911 and stays on the line until help arrives.

The program, piloted this year, has helped more than 60,000 callers so far and has a case resolution rate of 59.4%. Tele-EC does not replace the need for in-person emergency evaluation, but for veterans in rural areas or those with mobility issues, a call can save driving time, waiting and possible exposure to others' illnesses. It also doesn't require a copay.

Tele-EC is one of the many ways the VA is increasing veterans' access to VA health care. To enroll in VA care, visit <u>va.gov/health-care/how-to-apply</u>.

Future USS Iowa Delivered to U.S. Navy

GROTON, Conn. – The U.S. Navy Submarine Force's newest attack submarine, the future USS lowa (SSN 797) was delivered to the Navy on Dec. 21, 2024, marking the 12th battle force ship delivered to the Navy this calendar year.



SSN 797 is the 24th Virginia-class submarine (VCS) co-produced by General Dynamics Electric Boat (GDEB) and HII-Newport News Shipbuilding

through a long-standing teaming agreement and the 13th attack submarine delivered by GDEB.

The boat's delivery represents the official transfer of the submarine from the shipbuilder to the Navy. The submarine and crew will now undertake a series of tests and trials before commissioning into active service and providing additional capability to the fleet.

"The Virginia-class submarine represents a Navy and industry commitment to deliver warfighting excellence to the fleet," said Capt. Mike Hollenbach, Virginia Class Submarine program manager. "Iowa is the second Virginia-class submarine delivered this year. With each delivery, the Navy continues to strengthen our Nation's undersea advantage."

Virginia-class fast-attack submarines provide the Navy with the capabilities required to maintain the nation's undersea supremacy well into the 21st century. They have enhanced stealth, sophisticated surveillance capabilities and special warfare enhancements that enable them to meet the Navy's multi-mission requirements.

lowa is the sixth of 10 VCS Block IV configured attack submarines. NAVSEA will continue to put more players on the field—to ensure readiness for sustained high-end joint and combined combat.

SSN 797 is the fifth U.S. naval vessel, and first submarine, named after the Hawkeye State. Previous ships named USS lowa have included the highly decorated USS lowa (BB 61), commissioned in 1943, which served in World War II and the Korean and Vietnam Wars.

SSN 797 was christened at GDEB shipyard in Groton, Connecticut, Jun 17, 2023, by the ship's sponsor, Ms. Christie Vilsack. The submarine's commissioning ceremony is slated for Apr. 5, 2025 in Groton.

Recognized as the Force Behind the Fleet, NAVSEA translates warfighter requirements into combat capability, enabling our Nation and our allies to project presence in peace, power in war, and assured access always.

USS Montana arrives at new Pacific Fleet homeport in Hawaii



The Virginia-class fast-attack submarine USS Montana (SSN 794) arrived at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam following a change of homeport from Naval Station Norfolk, Virginia, December 23, 2024.

The USS Montana, a Virginia-class fast-attack submarine, arrived Dec. 23 at its new Pacific Fleet homeport, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam in Hawaii.

The \$2.6 billion USS Montana, also known as SSN 794, changed its homeport from Naval Station Norfolk, Virginia, the U.S. Navy said in a news release. It marks the ninth Virginia-class fast -attack submarine home-ported at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam. It will be assigned to Submarine Squadron 1 and is expected to serve the nation with a range of missions around the world for more than three decades, officials said.

"We're all very excited to be here in Pearl Harbor and we appreciate the great welcome," Cmdr. John Gilligan, commanding officer of USS Montana, said in the news release.

He credited the crew for "extraordinary work in Virginia to get to this significant milestone." Capt. Aaron Peterson, commander, Submarine Squadron 1, met the Montana pier-side upon arrival.

"On behalf of the Pacific Submarine Force Ohana, I enthusiastically welcome the officers and crew of the good ship Montana, with the warmth, culture, and spirit unique to the state of Hawaii," he said. Before finishing its homeport shift from the East Coast, Montana completed a postshakedown availability at Newport News Shipbuilding and was redelivered to the Navy in November 2024.

"Through a great effort by the crew, working with our industry partners, we've completed our availability and rejoined the Fleet. We're ready to execute any task we're called upon to complete throughout the Indo-Pacific," Gilligan said.

Commissioned on June 25, 2022, at Naval Station Norfolk, Montana is the second warship to be named after the state, following the armored cruiser USS Montana (ACR 13). The submarine is more than 377 feet long and can displace nearly 7,800 tons. Montana has a crew of nearly 140 sailors — all of whom have been named by Gov. Greg Gianforte as "honorary Montanans," — and can support various missions, including antisubmarine warfare, anti-surface ship warfare, strike warfare, and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance.

The U.S. Pacific Fleet Submarine Force provides strategic deterrence, anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface warfare, precision land strike, intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance, and early warning and special warfare capabilities around the globe.

Ron Davis, chair of the Montana-based USS Montana Committee, praised the reaching of the milestone.

"It signals that the submarine is that much closer to being tasked to accomplish any of a number of different missions as part of the Pacific Fleet," he said, adding the committee and all Montanans will continue to proudly support the Montana as it settles in Hawaii "and through her service life."

The nonprofit, nonpartisan committee is a group of volunteers from across the state who support the USS Montana. It was endorsed by the governor and Legislature in 2017.

The ship is decorated with a Montana theme with state rooms named after Montana cities. Passageways are named for Montana rivers. The crew mess area, called the Big Sky Saloon, includes a Glacier Park panorama.

The submarine also has a tribal victory/war song to be played aboard the submarine when the crew is called to battle stations. And in honor of the Treasure State's past of vigilante justice in the

19th century, the crew has adopted the nickname "The Vigilantes of the Deep." For more information:

What The Navy's Massive Orca Submarine Drone Is Actually Capable Of

We dive deep with the captain in charge of the Orca program on the drone's current abilities and what it could be capable of in the future.



The U.S. Navy's Orca drone, also known as the Extra-Large Unmanned Undersea Vehicle (XLUUV), has been in development for years, but will soon be in the hands of sailors as the sea service works to figure out how they will use the capability going forward. The Navy first ordered five of the semi-tractor trailer-sized submersible drones from Boeing Defense in 2019. But like other Navy acquisition programs, the Orca has been hit by cost increases and delivery delays.

To discuss where Orca stands, and where it could potentially go in a future that is trending more toward unmanned systems every day, *TWZ* chatted with Capt. Matt Lewis, a submariner and program manager for the Navy's Unmanned Maritime Systems office. Lewis shared his thoughts on the service's premiere submarine drone, its present and future capabilities, and the unique challenges drones face operating in an undersea domain, among other topics.

The Navy's Los Angeles-Class Is America's Most Successful Submarine

Key Points and Summary:

The Los Angeles-class submarines, introduced in the 1970s, have been the cornerstone of the U.S. Navy's Silent Service for decades.

-With 24 still active, these fast attack subs boast advanced sonar, stealth, and the ability to launch Tomahawk and Harpoon missiles.

-Post-1982 models, known as "Improved 688s," added vertical launch tubes and under-ice capabilities.

-Originally built to replace the Sturgeon-class, the Los Angeles-class has proven its versatility in warfare, reconnaissance, and carrier group support.

-Though slowly being replaced by the Virginiaclass, the Los Angeles-class remains a symbol of American naval strength and innovation, marking a legacy of unmatched success.



The Los Angeles-class Submarines, The Backbone of the Silent Service

The Los Angeles (SSN 688)-class submarines are the backbone of the United States Navy's submarine force, with 24 boats now on active duty and equipped with 12 Vertical Launch System tubes for firing Tomahawk cruise missiles.

The Navy procured 62 of these subs from 1970 –1990.

The Los Angeles-class is considered the best and most successful submarine in the United States' history.

The most famous Los Angeles-class submarine is probably the USS Dallas, SSN 700, which figured prominently in Tom Clancy's book Hunt for Red October.

The feature film of the same title starred Scott Glenn as Commander Bart Mancuso.

The Los Angeles class is a larger, faster successor to the Sturgeon-class submarines built in the 1960s. It features enhanced stealth capabilities and is equipped with advanced sensors, sonar, and a vertical-launch missile system.

The Los Angeles class could engage in

surface warfare, undersea warfare, and support carrier battle groups.

Its capabilities include wartime functions such as undersea warfare, surface warfare, strike warfare, mining operations, special forces delivery, reconnaissance, carrier battle group support and escort, and intelligence collection.

The Los Angeles class submarines, built after 1982, are called "Improved 688s" (I688s). They are quieter, incorporate an advanced combat system, and are configured for under-ice operation. The diving planes on the submarine were moved from the sail to the bow, and the sail was strengthened to break through ice.

The I688s also have twelve vertical launch tubes for Tomahawk Cruise Missiles.

Los Angeles-class Specs:

The Newport News Shipbuilding Co., General Dynamics Electric Boat Division, manufactures the 688s with 16 Officers and 127 Enlisted crew members.

- Draft: 9,4 meters
- Speed: 25+ knots (46+ km/h), max.

The subs use the Raytheon AN/BYG-2 Combat Control System and are designed to launch Tomahawk cruise missiles and Harpoon missiles vertically.

The sub can carry 26 torpedo tube-launched weapons, including Tomahawk missiles, Harpoon missiles, and Mark 48 ADCAP torpedoes to combat high-performance ships and fast attack submarines.

The submarine is fitted with four 533mm torpedo tubes in midships and a Mark 117 torpedo fire control system.

"The torpedo is capable of operating with or without wire guidance and uses either or both active and passive homing. It is equipped with multiple re-attack modes which operate if the target ship is missed. The torpedo carries out programmed target search, acquisition, and attack procedures," Naval Technology wrote.

Los Angeles-class Subs, Put the Fast In Fast

Attack Subs

While the exact speeds of the Los Angelesclass submarines are classified, the Navy has said the boat can travel at 25+ knots. Many naval analysts believe that the top speed is 30-33 knots. Tom Clancy thought the sub could rip off 37 knots (42.5 mph) at top speed.



The Los Angeles-class is powered by a General Electric S6G pressurized water reactor, a 165-megawatt reactor that drives two 26-MW steam turbines.

Each Los Angeles has an array of sensors and sonars, including the AN/BQQ-5 sensor suite, which gives the subs sonar capability. The AN-BBQ-5 was derived from the AN-BQQ-2 sonar system.

The Los Angeles-Class Is Slowly Being Phased Out

The submarines have had more than a 40-year career, and in the late 1990s, the Los Angelesclass was slated for replacement by the Seawolf class. But the Navy built only three of the advanced Seawolfs.

It wasn't until 2004 that the Navy commissioned its first Virginia-class submarine.



The Navy has thus far produced 22 of the newest Virginia-class boats. And with each one commissioned, the Navy retires a Los Angeles

sub.

The retired subs have served the Navy and the country well.

It may indeed be the most successful submarine in the history of the United States Navy.

An Apt Name For The Next Columbia-Class Submarine

(THE DAY 13 JAN 25) ... Brian Hallenbeck
U.S. Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro
announced Monday the third Columbia-class
ballistic-missile submarine will be named for
Groton, home of the Naval Submarine Base and
Electric Boat, where portions of the 12-ship class'
first two submarines are under construction.

Congress has yet to authorize or appropriate funding for the class' third boat.

Connecticut's senators, Richard Blumenthal and Chris Murphy, and Rep. Joe Courtney, whose 2nd District encompasses the base and the shipyard, promptly issued statements hailing the USS Groton's apt naming.

"Naming the USS Groton (SSBN 828) recognizes this iconic Connecticut town as the submarine capital of the world — honoring the unsurpassed skill and dedication of men and women who work there," Blumenthal said. "Groton has a rich shipbuilding legacy, and proven commitment to our national defense — manufacturing and maintaining vital weapons platforms, sustaining our undersea superiority."

"It is a proud community of hard workers, veterans, patriots, and public servants, and this honor celebrates them," he said.

Del Toro also announced Cynthia Blumenthal, the senator's wife, will be the boat's sponsor.

"It's only fitting the U.S. Navy is naming our next Columbia-class submarine after Groton, Connecticut — the submarine capital of the world," Murphy said. "This is a well-deserved recognition of Groton's rich history as a global leader in submarine technology and innovation, and a home to the thousands of Electric Boat workers and small businesses who power our nation's naval defense."

Courtney highlighted Groton's legacy.

"Today's decision by the U.S. Navy to honor Groton, Connecticut, as the name of its next

submarine is welcome news," he said. "Groton is the birthplace of the modern nuclear-powered Navy under Admiral Hyman G. Rickover and home to our nation's oldest submarine base as well as the Electric Boat shipyard whose talented shipbuilders have played a leading role since World War II where they constructed 74 submarines to fight the Axis powers. The naming of the third Columbia-class submarine as the future USS Groton is a well-deserved badge of honor that rightly acknowledges our community's historic role in the United States submarine force."

Cynthia Blumenthal, a military mother, has long advocated for service members and their families.

"I am tremendously honored to sponsor the future USS Groton and look forward to a lifelong relationship with the ship and its crew," she said. "On behalf of Connecticut's citizens, I thank the secretary of the Navy for this recognition. As a military parent, I know firsthand the commitment military families make in support of their members who serve. Those families also serve."

State Rep. Aundré Bumgardner, D-41st District, added, "The naming of the USS Groton is a profound acknowledgment of our town's unmatched contributions to the U.S. Navy and our nation's defense. As the submarine capital of the world, Groton's legacy in advancing undersea innovation, powered by the dedicated men and women of Electric Boat and the Naval Submarine Base, is unparalleled. This honor not only celebrates our storied history but also underscores the pivotal role our community continues to play in securing America's maritime superiority."

The submarine Groton will be the fourth Navy vessel named for the town, following a frigate (PF 29), which served from 1944 to 1946; a patrol craft (PCE 900), which operated in Hawaiian waters during World War II and served until 1960; and a nuclear fast-attack submarine (SSN 694), which completed an around-the-world cruise on its first deployment in 1980 and was decommissioned in 1997.

The first two Columbia-class submarines — USS District of Columbia (SSBN 826) and USS Wisconsin (SSBN 827) — are under construction at Electric Boat facilities in Groton and Quonset Point, R.I., and at Huntington-Ingalls Industries'

Newport News Shipbuilding in Virginia. Electric Boat is responsible for three-quarters of the boats' construction.

The District of Columbia is expected to deploy in 2030, the Navy has said.

U.S. Submarine Makes Stop In Gibraltar After Personnel Transfer

NAPLES, Italy — A U.S. Navy submarine spotted earlier this week near Gibraltar made a port visit to the city on Saturday, the service said.

The fast-attack submarine USS Indiana arrived in Gibraltar as part of a regularly scheduled visit, Cmdr. Timothy Gorman, a spokesman for U.S. 6th Fleet, said in a statement on Saturday. The statement did not indicate how long the submarine would remain in Gibraltar.

On Monday, area ship watchers spotted Indiana completing a personnel transfer and later photographed its arrival on Saturday at a U.K. navy base in the British territory near the Strait of Gibraltar. Indiana, which carries Tomahawk missiles, also was seen last month in the eastern Mediterranean Sea.

One of the last visits by a U.S. submarine to Gibraltar was in November 2022 when the ballistic missile submarine USS Rhode Island made a brief stop. Previously, the last ballistic missile submarine to make a port call there was USS Alaska in June 2021, according to the service.

The Navy typically does not announce the

location of its submarines. But in August, the service announced that guided-cruise missile submarine USS Georgia had completed training exercises in the eastern Mediterranean.

That announcement came as the Pentagon bolstered its forces in the Middle East amid deepening worries of an Israel-Iran conflict.

It wasn't clear on Saturday how long USS Indiana had been in the 6th Fleet area of responsibility, which spans from the Arctic Ocean to the coast of Antarctica, including the Adriatic, Baltic, Mediterranean and North seas, among others.

Indiana previously was deployed to 6th Fleet in 2022, traveling nearly 40,000 nautical miles during a more than 6-month deployment. It was only the second deployment for the submarine, homeported at the Naval Submarine Base New London in Connecticut, since its commissioning in 2018, according to the Navy.

120,000 Pound Nuclear Sub Sail Could Be Brought To Oak Ridge, Birthplace Of 'Nuclear Navy'

AMSE Director: Oak Ridge Could Be Called Birthplace Of 'Nuclear Navy'

(OAK RIDGER 27 JAN 25) ... Donna Smith
Oak Ridge's A.K. Bissell Park could become
the home for a 120,000-pound sail from a
decommissioned nuclear submarine, which
officials say highlights the city's role as birthplace
of the "Nuclear Navy."

Oak Ridge City Council gave approval Jan. 13 to the American Museum of Science and Energy Foundation's request to place the sail in Bissell Park - if the U.S. Navy gives the sail to the nonprofit that oversees AMSE and the K-25 History Center.

As city council member Ellen Smith explained at a meeting earlier this month, the sail is the elevated part that sticks up when a submarine is rising. The next step: the AMSE Foundation is sending a request to the U.S. Navy for the sail of the decommissioned USS Houston nuclear sub, according to a statement from AMSE leaders and board members. The sail is 17 feet tall, 30 to 40 feet long, and 10 to 12 feet wide.

And the weight? Two pieces are 50,000 and 42,000 pounds, according to AMSE information, and the third piece is 28,000 pounds.

"We do not know if the donation will occur, so we do not have a schedule (for its arrival)," the leaders and board members said in reply to The Oak Ridger's questions.

If the Navy agrees, it will gift the sail as donation to the foundation.

Why Oak Ridge would be appropriate as the sail's permanent home

Alan Lowe, the executive director of the American Museum of Science and Energy, said in a letter - included in the city council meeting agenda packet - that locating a nuclear submarine sail in Oak Ridge is appropriate since the city could be called the birthplace of the "Nuclear Navy" and every nuclear warhead on these submarines includes parts made at the Y-12 National Security Complex in the city.

"In 1946, then captain and later Admiral Hyman Rickover brought 100 naval officers to Oak Ridge to learn how nuclear energy could be captured to power a submarine," Lowe said in the letter. "This team developed the pressurized water reactor, which is now used to drive the country's nuclear fleet. In addition, the enriched uranium fuel, for the Nautilus, and many of the nuclear submarines past and present, that make up that fleet."

Building a monument with the sail would be a way to "honor all veterans who have served on any of our nuclear ships, along with Admiral Rickover and his team," Lowe wrote. "In addition to displaying the sail of the Houston, we hope in the future to add a life-size statue of Admiral Rickover."

"I think this is a great addition to Bissell Park," Council member Charlie Hensley said at the meeting prior to the council's approval of the AMSE Foundation's request. He noted that the USS Houston was the sub used in the filming of the movie "The Hunt for Red October," starring the late actors Sean Connery and James Earl Jones.

The sail monument would be located on the side of the park closest to the entrance to the Municipal Building and next to Tulane Avenue, on the opposite side of the creek from the memorial walk.

Although voting with the rest of council to allow AMSE to put the monument in Bissell Park, council member Chuck Hope cautioned council and city officials, saying "A.K. Bissell Park is only so big. We are stuffing it full."

Plans are underway for an improved walking trail at the park, and a memorial to the Scarboro 85, the 85 Black students who integrated Oak Ridge Schools in 1955. The park already has a playground, a performing arts pavilion, and the Peace Pavilion with the International Friendship Rell

About the USS Houston

Los Angeles-class fast attack submarine USS Houston was decommissioned during a ceremony held at Deterrent Park at Naval Base Kitsap-Bangor in Washington on Aug. 26, 2016, according to information from the Navy. Houston Sailors, past and present, along with families celebrated her 33 years of service that day.


The Associated Press and other sources, including the military, reported that before being decommissioned, the submarine leaked small amounts of water with small amounts of radiation in the Japanese ports of Sasebo and Okinawa, and in Guam. The U.S. Navy released a detailed chronology of the leaks over two years, showing that the cumulative radioactivity released was less than 9.3 micro curies.

"By comparison, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the average amount of radioactivity in a smoke detector is about one micro curie, or 1 millionth of a curie," according to an AP story.

If the Navy gives the sail to the AMSE
Foundation, it and its partners would be responsible for arranging and paying for transporting the sail to Oak Ridge, its subsequent reconstruction and display, Lowe stated in the letter. City Manager Randy Hemann a lot of work will be involved, as well, including decking and foundation for the sail because of its weight. He said the AMSE Foundation would be paying all costs.

On November 10, 1966, the USS Nautilus (SSN-571), while running submerged, collided with the USS Essex (CV-9) 350 miles off the coast of North Carolina. They were conducting an **underwater replenishment exercise.** Both ships needed extensive repairs. *This is what was reported in the news.*

This is what really happened:

The Nautilus was conducing a practice torpedo approach. Mel Lyman was on the plot, the guy who plots the attacking boat's position. When I visited him on board the Nautilus tied up at the subbase he told me, "I was supposed to know how close we were."

On a torpedo approach when you get to the final firing point the captain calls out, "Up scope for a final look around, then down scope," and you fire on the target.

In this case the captain saw nothing but grey steel, and he called out, "Down scope get me deep." Right before everyone heard a loud crunch.

Nobody was hurt. The Nautilus proceeded to the Electric Boat body shop to get the sail fixed. We heard about the mishap and the boat had a step sail coming up the Thames while we were at Electric boat getting the Hank L ready to go in commission.

This happened in the summer of 1966. Years later my neighbor Cal Pepper and I were talking and found out we were in the same fleet together. He was on the Essex.

The Submarine Force had lots of very expensive and highly technical equipment back in the sixties and still does. How are a bunch of young men able to operate all of it?

Admiral Rickover's Nuclear power program did it.

He interviewed each and every officer while they were midshipmen. The process was part of the Submarine Force. Back in 1964 I was not aware of the process but after I reported aboard the Henry L. Stimson, I learned of it. I didn't know what the men in civilian suits who shuffled us around were, I found out later they were PCO's.

I remember the classroom where our Gold Crew Wardroom met for instruction before we went to the torpedo approach trainer. It was a PCO classroom at the Subbase. Displayed above the blackboard was the very important message to all the Prospective Commanding Officers.

Changing the Home Person in Ancestry.com and Finding Relationship Links

Don Ort - Gold/SY1/Blue 69-74 and Tom Krauser - Blue 72-74

There may be times that you want to see how someone in your tree is related to everyone else in your tree or find how two people in your tree are linked. We can use Ancestry.com and Family Tree Maker to accomplish these tasks.

For example, Don Ort and Tom Krauser are 6th cousins 4x removed and have multiple great-grandparents in common. Sometimes we like to make the other person the Home Person in our tree to see how others in our tree are related to them. We can use Ancestry.com to easily switch the Home Person so all relationships are based on the new **Home Person**. If we want to know the path between two people, we can use Family Tree Maker to show that path.

Changing Home Person in Ancestry.com

To switch the **Home Person** in your tree in Ancestry.com do the following:

- Open Ancestry.com to any Profile
- Click on **Trees** in the **Menu bar**
- Click on Create and Manage Trees
- For your tree, click on **Tree settings**
- Under "**Your home person in this tree**" you should be listed as the home person.
- Click on **change** to select a new Home Person
- In the **Home Perso**n field start typing the name of the new Home Person as they appear in your tree
- For example, in Tom's tree, he wants to make Don Ort the new Home Person
- Start typing Don's name in the field and a list of people matching that name will appear
- Select the correct name from the list
- Uncheck ""I have selected myself as the Home Person" (when changing back to yourself as the Home Person make sure this box is checked)
- Click Select

- On the Tree setting page, under **Who you are in this tree**, select **change** and change **My name** to Don also
- Click Select and it should show Don under **Your home person in this tree** and **Who are you in this tree**
- Click on **Find in Tree** and type in Don's name then select him
- Click on Don to open his **Profile** and verify that since he is now the **Home Person** it should show no relationship for his Profile
- Click on his father or mother and it should show "father" or "mother" as the relationship to Don
- Now you can go to any person in the tree to see what that person's relationship is to Don
- For example, click on **Find in tree** and type your name (example, Tom's name)
- If now shows that Tom is Don's 6th cousin 4x removed
- For example, Hugh le Bigod (born about 1182) is Tom's 25th great-grandfather but shows as Don's 6th cousin 26x removed so there must be path from Don to Hugh le Bigod which we should be able to determine using Family Tree Maker

When you are done and want to make yourself the Home Person again, just repeat the steps above for changing the Home Person and check the box that you have made yourself the Home Person. Then check your Profile to make sure it changed you back and your parents show as your father and mother.

Finding Path Between Two People in Family Tree Maker

Now we would like to see the path from Don to Hugh le Bigod which we can do in **Family Tree Maker**.

- Open Family Tree Maker
- Under Tools select Relationship Calculator
- Under **Calculate relationship** click on the **Folder icon** to open the **Index of Individuals** and in the field type "Last name, First name", example, **Ort, Don** which should then display his name in the list to select from
- Select the correct name from the list and click **OK**
- In the next field click on the **Folder icon** then type name of person to determine path to, example: le Bigod, Hugh (make sure to select correct one if more than one person with same name)
- After selecting correct name click **OK**
- The path from Don to Hugh will now be displayed in the Path panel and the relationship of that path will be shown. Note that there may be more than one path between the two but only one (hopefully the closest path) is displayed

person (in this case our common 33rd great-grandfather) and the path down to each person selected When you look at the Relationship Chart you can see information from your tree. We use the Suffix field to show a lot more information about people (remember the Suffix field can hold 128 characters) and we use FK* is used in the Suffix field to show that person is included in the

• Click on the **View Relationship Chart** to get a "printable" **Report Preview** which shows the top

characters) and we use FK* is used in the Suffix field to show that person is included in the FamousKin.com program. You can then search for that person in the FamousKin program and see all the "famous" people that are related to them. This allows you to expand your tree from each person marked with a FK* to other famous people. By looking at the FamousKin program from people in the Relationship Chart, Don and Tom were able to see many other ancestors they had in common.

For example, Christopher Thomas Branch (Abt. 1602), Don's 10th great-grandfather, has a FK* on the Relationship Chart. If we open the FamousKin program and search for this person we get the link below.

We see that Thomas Jefferson is his 3rd great-grandson and all the other people that are related to Christopher Thomas Branch. Since this is a direct ancestor (great-grandfather) to Don all the people shown would be related to Don also.

Most of the people listed are common to both Don and Tom so there are many ancestors common between their trees. To expand your tree to the people shown you just have to click on the desired person and add the path shown to your tree. To show they came from the FamousKin program we add FK* to the Suffix field as we add each person to our tree.

Originally built in 1777 to protect the New London Harbor from British attack, the first masonry structure was destroyed after Benedict Arnold successfully raided the fort and the British burned New London to the ground.
